FADE IN:

MATT (V.O.)

Most people think Washington D.C.

is run by older, distinguished-

looking people like this...

CUT TO:

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*

INT. "MEET THE PRESS" TYPE SHOW - DAY (DAY 1)

WE SEE TWO SENATORS IN A TELEVISED DEBATE. THEY'RE IDENTIFIED BY CHYRONS -- <u>SENATOR TRENT ROGERS</u> (R-ARIZONA)--AN IMPOSING EX-ASTRONAUT AND <u>SENATOR BRYCE LOWELL</u> (D-NEW YORK)-- A HANDSOME BUT STIFF CANDICE BERGEN TYPE.

SENATOR ROGERS

This bill is about basic second

amendment rights.

SENATOR LOWELL

I disagree! What about the native

population of ptarmigan that could

be potentially endangered if this

hunting bill goes through?

(MORE)

SENATOR LOWELL (cont'd)

It seems to me that Republicans are

against "big government" except

when it allows them to kill cute

little animals.

HER REMARK SCORES WITH THE AUDIENCE. THE TAPE FREEZES.

MATT (V.O.)

But those words she just said? I

wrote them. And I'm twenty four

years old.

WE SEE <u>MATT O'BRIEN</u>, ATTRACTIVE AND INTELLIGENT (AN ADAM BRODY TYPE) STRIDING INTO AN OFFICE. <u>JASON SNYDER</u>, A PLUGGED-IN AND ENERGETIC GUY APPROACHES AND GIVES HIM A CONGRATULATORY PAT ON THE BACK.

MATT (V.O.) (cont'd)

See, that's the big secret about *
Washington D.C. It's actually run *
by young people. Maybe it's because *
we're the only ones who can tolerate *
working crazy hours for no money. *

WE SEE MATT AND JASON AT AN OFFICIAL FUNCTION SURREPTITIOUSLY STUFFING THEIR POCKETS WITH FOOD.

MATT (V.O.) (cont'd)

Or maybe it's because we're the *
only ones who can take the *
uncertainty that with every election *
you might be out of a job. And *
even between elections -- if your *
boss squeezes somebody's ass, twenty *
people have to update their resumes. *

WE SEE A TELEVISION. ON IT A PENITENT CONGRESSMAN MAKES A STATEMENT AS HIS WIFE GLARES AT HIM. PULL BACK TO REVEAL MATT AND UPSET CO-WORKERS PACKING BOXES.

MATT (V.O.) (cont'd)

We put up with the poverty and the *
instability because the upside is *
we get to run the country. But *
don't worry, it doesn't go to our *
heads.

SMASH CUT TO:

<u>INT. RESTAURANT - LATER (NIGHT 1)</u> AT THE BAR MATT AND JASON WATCH A REPLAY OF THE DEBATE.

MATT

(HANDS UP IN VICTORY) Yes! Yes!

Damn I'm good!

JASON

(ORDERING) Another beer for our

future President.

THE BARTENDER SETS DOWN A BEER.

MATT

(TO BARTENDER) That came fast!

I'm gonna make you an ambassador.

JASON

(CLINKS GLASSES) To a great day.

Today, Lowell's quoting you.

Tomorrow it's you up there. Which

reminds me -- I think it's time to

start building some name recognition.

(MORE)

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JASON (cont'd)

"Capitol Beat" magazine is running a "Fifty Hottest on the Hill" contest where they pick the best-looking people in DC. I want you to enter.

MATT

Do you ever wonder what your life would be like if you took all this energy that you invest in me and put it into yourself?

JASON

Pfft. I could never win an election. Too many skeletons.

MATT

What skeletons?

JASON

I don't have them <u>yet</u>. (GESTURES TO THE BAR) That's why I'm here. (NOTICES AN APPROACHING WOMAN) Now there's a candidate for "Hottest on the Hill."

MATT

Wow. Yeah, don't tell her about the contest, she'd kick my ass. How do I look?

JASON

(RE: TIE) You got sauce all over it. How does this always happen? When you run for office we are gonna seriously have to think about bibs.

HE SWITCHES HIS TIE WITH MATT'S. THEY MAKE THE TRANSFER JUST BEFORE THE <u>WOMAN APPROACHES</u>. THIS IS <u>MAGGIE</u>, AN ATTRACTIVE AND INTELLIGENT WOMAN (AN ANNE HATHAWAY TYPE).

MAGGIE

(TO MATT) Do you mind moving over?

You're kinda hogging the hotwings.

MATT

Sure. (MAKES ROOM) Hey, I'm Matt.

HE SHAKES HER HAND WITH A TWO-HANDED GRIP.

MAGGIE

Wow. Somebody's planning on running

for something. You've got that two-

handed, "can I count on your vote?",

handshake down pat.

JASON

We've been practicing it. Do you *

think it's too much thumb?

MATT

Jason? Go away.

JASON TURNS AWAY TO GIVE THEM SOME PRIVACY. MAGGIE REACHES FOR A HOTWING.

MATT (cont'd)

So, you like hotwings, huh?

*

MAGGIE

Wow. You're not good at this.

MATT

I admit I may be a little off my	*
game. I've just been slammed at	*
work. See, I'm a legislative aide	*
for (SEEING HER FACE) What?!	

MAGGIE

I just hate how all the guys in DC can't wait to namedrop their jobs. They'll find a way to fit it into any conversation. "You like jazz? That's so funny because I work at the Defense Department."

MATT

Yeah, everybody does that, even people who <u>don't</u> report directly to a Senator like I do.

SHE SMILES AND REACHES FOR ANOTHER HOTWING.

MATT (cont'd)

Don't eat that. Let me take you to dinner. I know a great burger place down the block.

MAGGIE

I'm here with a friend.

MATT

Bring her. The burgers are cheap.

(MORE)

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*

*

MATT (cont'd)

I can buy three. I'm serious, I

wish they cost more. They're like

eighty cents. It's scary.

MAGGIE LAUGHS AND CROSSES TO HER FRIEND <u>CHEYENNE</u> AT A NEARBY TABLE. CHEYENNE IS CUTE AND FUN BUT A BIT WILD.

CHEYENNE

Hey, I got you a beer.

MAGGIE

I asked for a club soda.

CHEYENNE

And then I rolled my eyes and got

you a beer.

MAGGIE

That guy at the bar wants to take

us to dinner.

CHEYENNE

(LOOKS) Ooh, he's cute.

MAGGIE

Not him.

CHEYENNE

(LOOKS AT ANOTHER) Ooh, he's cute.

MAGGIE

Yeah, not him either. This may go

quicker if I just point him out.

SHE DISCREETLY POINTS MATT OUT.

CHEYENNE

(SINCERE) He's the best one!

*

*

*

MAGGIE

I think I might be interested so I'm pretending to invite you along but I need you to shake your head like you can't come.

CHEYENNE SHAKES HER HEAD.

MAGGIE (cont'd)

And that's how it feels to say "no"

to a man. (THEN) Okay, bye.

CHEYENNE

I have never been more proud of

you!

MAGGIE RETURNS TO MATT.

MAGGIE

Yeah, she can't make it. Too bad.

MATT

Then it's just us. You ready?

MAGGIE

I don't know... I feel like you

should have to work a little harder.

(THINKS) I'll go if you can name

all fourteen cabinet posts.

MATT

There are fifteen.

MAGGIE

You just moved past phase one.

MATT

Okay, I can do this. Defense, State, Treasury -- the only real ones. Next... Justice, Agriculture, Energy, Commerce -- the snazziest dressers. Labor -- the worst dressers. Then the H's -- Health and Human Services, Homeland Security and HUD. Transportation and Education, or as I like to call them -- the "a-tions". And finally, the last in the chain of command, if the head of this becomes President something has gone seriously wrong -- Veteran's Affairs! Tah Dah!

MAGGIE

You're missing one.

MATT

Really?!

JASON TRIES TO HELP BY MIMING.

MATT (cont'd)

I have no idea what you are doing! (JASON MIMES SOME MORE) Department of Crazy?

MAGGIE

Too bad. I was really looking forward to having dinner <u>inside</u> somewhere. Not in an exterior place. MATT

Department of Interior!

JASON

Finally!

MAGGIE

(SMILES) Darn, now I guess I have

to go.

MATT

Shall we, Miss...?

MAGGIE

It's Maggie.

MATT

Hey, Maggie.

HE SHAKES HER HAND WITH TWO HANDS BUT IN A SOFTER WAY.

MAGGIE

Now that handshake could get you

some votes.

THERE'S A MOMENT OF ATTRACTION.

MAGGIE (cont'd)

(NOTICES) You got sauce on your tie.

MATT

(LOOKS DOWN) How?! I didn't even

touch the plate!

AND WE...

FADE OUT.

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END OF TEASER

ACT ONE

SCENE B

INT. SENATOR LOWELL'S OFFICE - THE NEXT DAY (DAY 2) (ELLIOT, ERIC, JASON, LOLLY, MATT, MAGGIE, SENATOR LOWELL, WOMAN)

<u>MATT ENTERS</u>, UPBEAT. A NERDY CONGRESSIONAL PAGE, <u>ELLIOT</u>, SITS IN THE RECEPTION ANTEROOM. MATT PICKS UP MAIL AND VARIOUS NEWSPAPERS AND RUFFLES ELLIOT'S HAIR.

MATT

Great to see ya, buddy.

ELLIOT

(CONFUSED) You hate me. Every day

you come in here, point to my blazer,

call me a stewardess and tell me

you want a bloody Mary.

MATT

I guess I'm just in a good mood.

Today, make it a mimosa.

MATT ENTERS THE MAIN OFFICE AND IS APPROACHED BY JASON WHO IS HOLDING AN OLD COPY OF "CAPITOL BEAT" MAGAZINE.

JASON

You wanna know something weird? After you left, I actually hooked up with a girl from the Department of Interior. She thought my miming was excellent. How was your night?

*

*

MATT

The best. Maggie's so cool and fun to talk to -- it's like talking to you. And she's gorgeous. (REALIZES) I may never need to talk to you

again.

<u>ERIC</u>, THE CHIEF OF STAFF, LATE THIRTIES, BALDING <u>APPROACHES</u>. ERIC HAS STAYED TOO LONG IN THIS JOB. AS A RESULT, HE'S A LITTLE BEATEN DOWN AND BITTER.

ERIC

Staff meeting in the Senator's office. (OFF MAGAZINE) Hey, "Fifty hottest on the Hill". You know I made that list in ninety-five.

JASON AND MATT SHARE INCREDULOUS LOOKS. TIME HAS NOT BEEN KIND TO ERIC. THEY START TO GATHER THEIR THINGS.

JASON

Well, great. You're finally moving on. This is the first time in five years I have heard you talk about a girl other than Kate. I was gonna speak to you about getting a first lady. (LEANS IN) I heard someone in the office thought you were gay.

MATT

Wonder if it's 'cause you're always

whispering in my ear!

THEY ENTER THE SENATOR'S OFFICE AND TAKE THEIR SEATS NEXT TO LOLLY, A DIM CO-WORKER.

MATT (cont'd)

Hey Lolly, how was your weekend?

LOLLY

Only okay. I had guests in town and they wanted to see the National Mall -- which as it turns out is not actually a mall, but a bunch of buildings and museums, did you know that? Such a disappointment.

MATT

I know what you mean. Every time I see the Washington Monument I think, "What a waste. This could be a Panda Express!"

JASON

(SOTTO) How much money did her Dad

give to the Senator's campaign again?

MATT

Not enough.

SENATOR LOWELL (SEEN IN THE EARLIER DEBATE) ENTERS.

SENATOR LOWELL

Okay, everyone. The Senate's in *
session in twenty minutes so let's
move quickly. Matt, where are we *
on the Ethics reform resolution? *

*

*

*

*

*

MATT

Anything else?

ERIC

Yeah, we got back the latest poll numbers and they're generally good but there's one area I'm concerned about -- the numbers were low for the question, "Is the Senator someone you would want to share a beer with?"

*

SENATOR LOWELL

Oh, this is nonsense. I'm very *
much one of the people. I mean, *
don't you all agree? Wouldn't you
want to have a beer with me?

THERE IS A LONG SILENT BEAT.

SENATOR LOWELL (cont'd)

Hypothetically.

JASON/ERIC/MATT

Oh, yeah. Definitely. I'm in!

SENATOR LOWELL

(BITTER) You know this is probably *
the kind of thing that Senator Rogers *
scores really high on. Because he *
actually has had a beer with *
everyone. I swear he became an *
Astronaut because he thought Tang *
had alcohol. *

ERIC

Any ideas on how to fix this, people?

JASON

Well, we can try and get you on the late night shows. Have you tell a couple of jokes or a funny story. Do you have any of those?

SENATOR LOWELL

(EXCITED) Ooo, I know! I can recite a poem by Emily Dickinson.

*

*

ERIC

Senator, we want people to want to drink a beer with you not <u>because</u> of you.

LOLLY

What about inviting a magazine to	*
photograph you and your husband at	*
home?	

IT GETS AWKWARDLY QUIET.

LOLLY (cont'd)

What?	Why does this always happen	*
when I	talk?	*

SENATOR LOWELL

(VERY BUSINESS LIKE) Now is not a	*
good time. Mr. Lowell is currently	*
in "the dog house" for a certain	*
indiscretion that was too flagrant	*
to be overlooked. You will also	*
notice Cathy is no longer with us.	*

ERIC

Okay, moving on! I think we still need a solution to this beer issue.

MATT

What about a baseball game? The Senator goes back to New York for a game. She wears a baseball hat and jeans. She can even drink an actual beer.

*

ERIC

Let's keep thinking.

SENATOR LOWELL

I'm intrigued by Matt's idea.

ERIC

(STUNG) Okay, then.

MATT

We could also surround you with people who look like they're having a good time, make it seem like <u>the</u> place to be -- Lolly, can you find some fun people to put in the box with the Senator?

LOLLY

You mean like clowns?

MATT

You know what? I'll take care of

the people -- just find me a hat.

ELLIOT THE PAGE POKES HIS HEAD IN.

ELLIOT

(TO MATT) Some constituents are

here for their tour.

MATT GETS UP TO GO.

SENATOR LOWELL

Smart idea, Matt.

MATT REACTS, PLEASED. JASON MIMES "YOU ARE ON FIRE." MATT IGNORES HIM AND ENTERS THE RECEPTION ANTEROOM.

MATT

(TO THE TOUR) Hey, I'm Matt O'Brien, one of Senator Lowell's aides. If you'll follow me... (LEADS THEM DOWN A HALLWAY) we are currently in the Russell Senate building, named after the legendary Celtics Center Bill Russell. (BEAT) Ah, just a test to see if you were listening. The building is actually named after Senator Richard Russell of Georgia. (NOTICES A RAISED HAND) Yes, Ma'am?

WOMAN

(POINTING) What do they do?

MATT

Those are Congressional pages...

THE GROUP SHIFTS AND MATT SPOTS MAGGIE IN A PAGE UNIFORM. SHE'S IN A CONVERSATION AND DOESN'T SEE HIM.

MATT (cont'd)

(SHOCKED) They're high school

students who deliver the mail.

HE TURNS BACK TO THE TOUR GROUP BUT HE'S STILL REELING.

MATT (cont'd)

Uh... and that's how a bill becomes

a law. Thanks! Bye!

HE ABANDONS THE TOUR AND RUNS DOWN THE HALL.

FADE OUT.

END OF ACT ONE

ACT TWO

SCENE C

<u>INT. SENATOR LOWELL'S OFFICE - MOMENTS LATER</u> (ELLIOT, MATT)

MATT RUSHES IN. HE GRABS ELLIOT BY THE SHOULDERS.

MATT

(WITH URGENCY) How old are you?!

ELLIOT

(NERVOUS) Uh...

MATT

What's the oldest you can be?!

ELLIOT

Uh, if I talk in a (FAKE DEEP VOICE)

deep voice like this (NORMAL VOICE)

people usually let me buy beer.

MATT

No, the pages. How old are the pages?

ELLIOT

Oh. Usually eighteen.

MATT

Well, could be worse.

ELLIOT

(THINKS) But I think Charlie's

like sixteen.

MATT

(PANICKED) What?!

ELLIOT

(BACKING DOWN) Eighteen! We're

all eighteen!

MATT RUSHES OUT. AND WE...

CUT TO:

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<u>SCENE</u> D

<u>INT. SENATE BUILDING HALLWAY - MOMENTS LATER (DAY 2)</u> (MATT, MAGGIE)

MATT RUNS DOWN THE HALLWAY AND FINDS MAGGIE.

MAGGIE

(LIGHTING UP) Hey!

MATT

We need to talk. Uh, you weren't

totally honest with me last night.

MAGGIE

Oh.

MATT

Yeah. (POINTS TO HER UNIFORM AND NAME TAG) How could you not tell me?

MAGGIE

I'm sorry... it's just so hard to figure out a good way to do it. People usually treat me differently after they find out I'm Senator Rogers' daughter.

MATT

You're what?!

MAGGIE

(POINTS AT NAME TAG) Rogers, the Republican Senator from Arizona, used to be an Astronaut--

MATT

I know who he is! I didn't know you were related to him! I was just freaked out that you were a page! This is really bad!

MAGGIE

So what are you more upset about -that I'm a page or that I'm a Republican?

MATT

I don't know! They're both so terrible!

MAGGIE

Well, you can relax, I'm eighteen.

MATT

Oh good, so it's not illegal, just reprehensible. I don't understand why you didn't tell me you were a page?! That seems like pretty important information.

MAGGIE

Why would I tell you? I'm of legal age. I'm a page for the summer and then I'm going to Georgetown.

23. (II/D)

MATT

You got into Georgetown? Those bastards wait-listed me. (BACK TO PANIC) I can't believe you're Senator Rogers' daughter. Mr. Ultra-Conservative Space-man. You know, we've sent a lot of people up there. It's not that special anymore!

MAGGIE

I don't see what this has to do *
with the fact that we had an amazing *
time last night. (FLIRTY) And we *
could have an amazing time again *
tonight. Maybe we should duck behind *
this statue of Henry Clay right now
so I can show you -- *

MATT

First of all, that's Daniel Webster. *
Second, what time tonight -- wait *
what am I saying? We can't see *
each other again -- your Dad is one *
of my boss' biggest enemies. They
were on just on TV debating each *
other. *

MAGGIE

You work for Bryce Lowell? Ew.

*

*

MATT

Ew? What are you "ewing"? Health *
care for the forty seven million *
who are uninsured? A living wage *
for the working poor? *

MAGGIE

You're as self-righteous as she is. She seems like a real fun gal.

MATT

(DEFENSIVE) Hey, we're working on that!

MAGGIE

And that debate was ridiculous. Who was the idiot who thought it was a good idea to bring up the hunting of ptarmigan as this huge problem?

MATT

You didn't think he was an idiot a second ago when you wanted to duck behind Daniel Webster over here.

MAGGIE

The ptarmigan population is flourishing -- they reached record highs in 2006. Do you even know what a ptarmigan is?

MATT

Of course. (BLUFFS) It's a dog.

*

MAGGIE

It's a bird.

MATT

A bird-like dog.

MAGGIE

How perfectly knee-jerk liberal that you don't even know what you're rallying to save. If you're curious I have a stuffed one I can show you some time.

MATT

See, they're cute. You have a stuffed one. (REALIZING) Oh, you mean a *stuffed* one?! Like with the insides missing and the glass eyes?

MAGGIE

(PROUD) Yep. I've been a hunter since I was nine.

MATT

So you're eighteen <u>and</u> a Republican <u>and</u> a hunter. Fan-tastic.

MAGGIE

You keep harping on my age. I really don't understand what the big deal is. I've always been mature for my age --

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*

*

MATT

Well, sure, you grow up fast when you have to protect the prairie with your shotgun.

MAGGIE

And I've always dated older men.

MATT

Well not this one. I have a political future and this is a scandal waiting to happen. Plus, I disagree with pretty much everything you believe in and oh yeah, I think your dad is the devil.

MAGGIE LOOKS HURT.

MATT (cont'd)	r
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Sorry, I guess I'm just thrown by this. Last night we seemed so...

MAGGIE

Yeah, well, I guess that was last

night. So... goodbye.

MATT

Yeah, I guess I'll see you... never.

MAGGIE

Wow, that's dramatic and appropriately hysterical for someone in your party.

AND WE...

<u>SCENE E</u>

INT. SENATE CLOAKROOM - LATER (DAY 2)			
(CHEYENNE, MAGGIE, SENATOR ROGERS, SENATOR FURMAN)	*		
WE'RE IN AN IMPOSING WOOD-PANELED ROOM OFF THE SENATE			
FLOOR. AN ANCIENT SENATOR IS SITTING, STARING STRAIGHT			
AHEAD, NOT TOTALLY PRESENT. MAGGIE HANDS HIM A WATER.			
MAGGIE			
Can I get you anything else Senator	*		
Furman?	*		
HE CONTINUES TO STARE STRAIGHT AHEAD.			
MAGGIE (cont'd)			
Okay, then.	*		
HER DAD, <u>SENATOR TRENT ROGERS</u> (SEEN IN THE EARLIER DEBATE) <u>APPROACHES</u> HER.			
SENATOR ROGERS			
(RE: FURMAN) I know. It's scary	*		
that he gets to vote.	*		
MAGGIE			
It's scary that he gets to drive.	*		
(THEN) You look nice.	*		
SENATOR ROGERS			
I'm delivering the eulogy at Speaker	*		
Stevens funeral. Sad day. Although	*		
I do love watching the Democrats	*		
squirm in their bad seats.	*		
(MORE)			

SENATOR ROGERS (cont'd)

(BIG SMILE) I called in a few favors *
to make sure that Lowell was put in *
Siberia. Can you believe that cheap *
shot she got off about ptarmigans *
actually scored some points? We *
got a fight on our hands. You know *
what this reminds me of? *

MAGGIE

(KNOWS WHERE THIS IS GOING) Space.

SENATOR ROGERS

(DOESN'T HEAR HER) Space. It's *
not easy to get there. It involves *
a lot of man-hours, training, blood, *
sweat, and tears. But we go because *
it's the right thing to do.

MAGGIE

(HEARD IT BEFORE) Yeah, Dad, I know.

SENATOR ROGERS

Well, I'd better get back to work. See ya at home, Pumpkin.

HE KISSES HER CHEEK. SOMEONE PASSES BY AND SEES.

SENATOR ROGERS (cont'd)

(CLARIFYING) Father-daughter.

Can't be too careful these days.

HE CROSSES AWAY. <u>CHEYENNE</u> <u>APPROACHES</u> WITH A MAGAZINE.

MAGGIE

(SHOCKED)	Is that "Hustler"?	*
	CHEYENNE	

Yeah, Larry Flynt sends it free to	*
every member of Congress. And	*
someone keeps leaving their copy in	*
here. I'm dying to find out who it	*
is so I can vote for him! (THEN)	*
Hey, I was thinking, if you see	*
that guy again do you want to borrow	*
that shirt of mine that I always	
wear as a dress?	

MAGGIE

First of all, that comes up to (INDICATES BELT HEIGHT) here and it doesn't matter. It's over.

CHEYENNE

What? Why?

MAGGIE

Uh, let's see, I'm too young, I'm too Republican, I hunt...

CHEYENNE

I thought guys found the hunting sexy.

MAGGIE

They do but the repressed ones can't admit it.

MAGGIE (cont'd)

Basically, he found out about my job and my dad and flipped. See, he works for Senator Lowell.

CHEYENNE

Ew.

MAGGIE

That's what I said! Anyway, he *
doesn't want to have anything to do *
with me. *

CHEYENNE

(SQUEEZING HER HAND) Aww, Maggie.

MAGGIE

It's so frustrating sometimes. I feel like I've been thirty since I was ten and I just wish the rest of me would catch up. I'm tired of waiting to do all the things I want to do, do you know what I mean?

CHEYENNE

(BEAT, SINCERE) No. I've never waited to do anything in my life.

MAGGIE

It's true. You have like no impulse control.

CHEYENNE

It's because I'm from Alaska.

(MORE)

CHEYENNE (cont'd)

There's not a lot of sunlight. You gotta make your own fun. Hey, want to hit Bullfeathers tonight? Should be a lot of cute guys...

MAGGIE

You are dedicated.

CHEYENNE

Look, I gotta find a man or a job before this is done -- because I won't go back there. There's like <u>no</u> sunlight!

MAGGIE

Sorry. I'm not up for it.

CHEYENNE

	(BEAT)	You	liked	him,	huh? *	•
ACCTE	NODS SADIV				*	•

MAGGIE NODS SADLY.

CHEYENNE (cont'd)

So why you can't be together? Who cares about the age difference? * And being on opposite sides just * makes it more exciting! Like with * that bald Cajun guy who worked for * Clinton and that angry lady! *

MAGGIE

You didn't see his face. It's done.

CHEYENNE

(HAS AN IDEA) We'll see about that.

CUT TO:

SCENE H

<u>INT. SENATOR LOWELL'S OFFICE - LATER (DAY 2)</u> (ERIC, JASON, LOLLY, MATT, MAGGIE)

<u>MATT ENTERS</u>, STILL UPSET FROM HIS CONVERSATION WITH MAGGIE. <u>LOLLY RUNS</u> UP TO HIM WITH TWO BASEBALL HATS.

LOLLY

Which hat do you want the Senator

To wear?

MATT

What?

LOLLY

For the baseball game tonight? Do

you want her to wear a Yankees hat

or a Mets hat?

MATT

Oooh no! Oh no, oh no, oh no!

LOLLY

(CRINGING) Did I mess up again?

Do I need my Dad to send a check?

MATT

No. This is my fault. By sending her to a game, I'm making her choose a favorite home town team.

(MORE)

MATT (cont'd)

People have really strong feelings about this -- no matter who she picks, she's gonna piss off half of her constituents.

LOLLY

Really? People care that much?

MATT

(DEMONSTRATING, CALLING) Hey Jason,

what do you think of the Mets?

JASON

The Mets suck!

ERIC

(OVERHEARING) "The Mets suck"?

The Yankees suck!

MATT

Thank you, gentleman. You've proved my point.

JASON

(STILL UPSET) Yeah, the Yankees have sucked their way to twenty six world championships, bitch!

ERIC

(EQUALLY UPSET) Just like your mother --

MATT

Whoa, that devolved fast! See the point is people feel strongly.

LOLLY

So we won't put her in a hat.

MATT

No, we already told the press she was gonna be at the game. They're gonna ask who she prefers. Look, don't do anything yet -- I gotta figure this out.

JASON APPROACHES WITH AN OLD COPY OF "CAPITOL BEAT".

LOLLY

Ooh. "The Hottest on the Hill."

(OFF PHOTO) Who's that? He's cute.

MATT

That's the President, Lolly.

LOLLY

(DEFENSIVE) I've just never seen

him from that angle.

SHE CROSSES AWAY.

MATT

Listen, I need to talk to you about something.

JASON

Yeah, me, too. What about (HOLDS UP A CANDID) this photo of you for the "Hottest on the Hill" contest?
*

MATT

Maggie - that girl from last night --

is a Congressional page and Senator

Rogers' daughter.

THERE'S A BEAT AND THEN JASON TEARS UP THE PHOTOGRAPH.

JASON

Won't be needing this 'cause you

won't be running for anything ever.

MATT

I didn't know! She just told me a few hours ago in the hall. But don't worry, she's eighteen and I ended it right away.

JASON

(PACING) So she never disclosed who she was. We'll say you were too dumb to know better. That defense always works.

MATT

(BEAT) It's just too bad -- She was... (WITH AFFECTION) feisty. She didn't let me get away with anything. (TESTING THE WATERS) I keep wondering... maybe there's some way... I mean she <u>is</u> eighteen. She's technically legal.

*

JASON

Well I think we have our campaign slogan -- I went out with a teenager who was technically legal! (THEN) Look, this is simple. You're a staffer, she's a page -- it sounds bad. You make a problem and there are a million other guys just dying to step in and do your job. Think of all the things you've given up to be here. When people were going crazy at a party in college, what did you do?

MATT

I'd leave the party so there would be no photos of me drinking underage.

JASON

And when it was Spring Break and we were all going to Cancun for a wild orgy, what did you do?

MATT

I volunteered for the Red Cross.

JASON

And when a bunch of us got your dog high, what did you do?

MATT

I didn't know you did that.

JASON

(UNFAZED) Because I protect you

from stuff like that. I look out

for you. Like I'm doing right now.

MATT

(DISTURBED) You got Roxie high?

JASON

This isn't just about you. You screw this up and I gotta go find another guy. You know how hard it

is to find a good guy?

A CO-WORKER PASSES BY AND OVERHEARS THIS.

MATT

You won't be satisfied until everyone

thinks I'm gay.

JASON

I'm telling you -- avoid this girl.

MATT

You're right. You're right. I

know you're right.

ERIC BRINGS AN UNCOMFORTABLE MAGGIE INTO THE OFFICE.

ERIC

Hey, everybody, I'd like you to

meet our new page.

OFF MATT AND JASON'S REACTIONS, WE...

FADE OUT.

END OF ACT TWO

ACT THREE

SCENE J

<u>INT. SENATOR LOWELL'S OFFICE - MOMENTS LATER (DAY 2)</u> (JASON, LOLLY, MATT, MAGGIE)

MATT AND JASON PULL MAGGIE ASIDE.

MATT

You've been assigned to this office?

JASON

Yeah, what's your game, missy?

MAGGIE

"Missy"? Really? (THEN) Look,

all I know is my supervisor told me that someone put in paperwork and marked it urgent.

MATT

Well, I didn't put the request in so I can't imagine who did.

MAGGIE

Wait. I think I know. Uch, I am gonna kill her! I don't know how she did it but she is gonna be on the next boat back to Anchorage so fast--

MATT

So you're gonna be working here every day? Like coming to this office every day? Like when I walk in, you'll be here, every day?

MAGGIE

I'm starting to see why they waitlisted you at Georgetown.

MATT

I just don't understand how that's gonna work.

JASON

It's not. Listen, Maggie, you don't

want to work here, right?

MAGGIE

Not particularly.

JASON

So what if we put in paperwork for

a transfer?

MAGGIE

Well, I'd have to give a reason.

JASON

Fine. Use me. (BRAINSTORMING)

Say I was condescending and rude.

MAGGIE

You actually are condescending and rude.

*

JASON

Even better! If I filled out the

forms, would you send them in?

MAGGIE

I guess --

JASON

(SPRINGING INTO ACTION) I'm on it!

<u>HE LEAVES.</u> MAGGIE AND MATT ARE LEFT ALONE. IT'S AWKWARD AND QUIET.

MAGGIE

You got something on your tie again.

SHE REACHES OUT TO TOUCH HIS TIE.

MATT

(TORTURED) Just leave it!

LOLLY APPROACHES.

LOLLY

Hey, you're our new page? I'm Lolly. You're Senator Rogers daughter aren't you?

MATT

This you know?! You can't recognize the left side of the President's face but this you know! Unbelievable!

AND WE...

CUT TO:

SCENE K

<u>INT. SENATOR ROGER'S HOUSE - THE NEXT DAY (DAY 3)</u> (KATERINA, MAGGIE, SENATOR ROGERS)

SENATOR ROGERS AND HIS WIFE, <u>KATERINA</u>, A HANDSOME EUROPEAN-BORN WOMAN, ARE EATING IN THE BREAKFAST AREA OF A GEORGETOWN HOUSE. <u>MAGGIE ENTERS</u> IN UNIFORM.

SENATOR ROGERS

Hello, Pumpkin. Want some toast?

MAGGIE

That'd be great.

KATERINA

(EUROPEAN ACCENT) I'll get you

some more buh-tah, dear.

SHE EXITS.

SENATOR ROGERS

How many years has she lived here?

How can she still have an accent?!

MAGGIE

The voters don't care about stuff like that.

SENATOR ROGERS

Yeah, but they don't want their first lady to sound like the Count from "Sesame Street" either.

(MORE)

SENATOR ROGERS (cont'd)

(THEN) So where are you gonna be working today? The cloakroom again? MAGGIE

Uh, no. Actually, I've been assigned to Bryce Lowell's office.

SENATOR ROGERS

What?!

MAGGIE

It's temporary--

SENATOR ROGERS

You know she's the enemy! She's * trying to sabotage the hunting bill. * She filibustered against my Insurance * Protection Act. And when we served * on the Intelligence Committee she * tried to kill the mission I sent to * Syria!

MAGGIE	*
We were in Syria?	*
SENATOR ROGERS	*
(BEAT) No. (THEN) I do not want	*
you working there!	*
MAGGIE	
It's for a few days until my transfer	*
goes through. Isn't there a chance	*

I could learn something?

*

SENATOR ROGERS

No.

MAGGIE

(TAKEN ABACK) Just no? How can we be certain we're right if we don't even listen to the other side?

SENATOR ROGERS

Just trust me. I happen to know a

lot more about this than you do!

KATERINA REAPPEARS.

KATERINA

The two of you with your tempers. Please don't holler (PRONOUNCED "HOLL-AH").

SENATOR ROGERS/MAGGIE

(CORRECTING HER) Holler! Holler!

AND WE...

CUT TO:

<u>SCENE M</u>

INT. SENATOR LOWELL'S OFFICE - LATER (DAY 3) (ERIC, GUY, JASON, MATT, MAGGIE, SENATOR LOWELL) MATT STOPS BY JASON'S CUBICLE AND FINDS HIM ON THE PHONE.

JASON

(INTO PHONE) So can we count on your support for Matt in the "Fifty Hottest on the Hill" contest? Jack in Veterans' Affairs? Listen, if you want to vote for Jack over my guy, fine. But do me one favor -just come over and look at my guy's skin. Thank you. (HANGS UP) This contest is not going to be a cake walk.

MATT

Well, let me make this easier for	
you stop. It's silly and	*
frivolous and I don't want you to	*
enter me under any circumstances.	*

JASON

Or what? You gonna have your girlfriend shoot me?

MATT

You know I saw her out on the balcony

before -- smoking a cigar!

JASON

So she's a Republican who hunts and smokes cigars. Basically, you're attracted to an eighty year old guy.

ERIC APPROACHES.

ERIC

The Senator is getting ready to leave for her (EYE ROLL) revolutionary "politician at a baseball game" photo op. You guys wanna prep her?

MATT NODS AND GETS UP. MAGGIE ENTERS WITH A PACKAGE.

MAGGIE

Hey, I need the Senator's signature.

MATT

We're just heading in there now.

THEY ENTER SENATOR LOWELL'S OFFICE. SHE'S THERE.

MATT (cont'd)

Hello Senator. You ready for the

game?

SENATOR LOWELL

Do you know if Derek Jeter is seeing * anyone? *

MATT

I'm sorry?

SENATOR LOWELL

I've always found him attractive and Mr. Lowell owes me one. What do you think?

MATT

I think my job just got a lot * weirder.

JASON

Uh, Senator, we don't want you to *
be late, we should move this along -- *
we have this New York Yankees jersey *
that we want you to wear.

THE SENATOR PUTS THE JERSEY ON OVER HER CLOTHES.

MATT

And this is the New York Mets jacket

that we want you to wear over that.

SHE PUTS IT ON OVER HER JERSEY. MATT TOSSES HER A HAT.

MATT (cont'd)

And here's a Mets cap to wear. With a Yankees helmet to go with it. Each inning I want you to change things around so that no one article of clothing gets more air time.

SENATOR LOWELL

Would you also like to drape me in the tarp they use to cover the field when it rains?

MAGGIE CAN'T HELP IT AND GIVES A DERISIVE SNORT.

MATT

Something funny?

MAGGIE

You're trying have it both ways and	*
please everybody but it's not gonna	*
work. No one will believe she's a	*
real fan of either team.	

JASON

Why is she talking? *

MATT

(BEAT) She's right. She's totally right.

JASON

So what are we supposed to do?

MATT

Senator, which team do you really

like?

SENATOR LOWELL

Well, don't tell Derek but neither. *
I've been a Cubs fan since I was a *
little girl. *

MATT

Then you should wear a Cubs hat.

*

JASON

Then we piss off fans of both teams.

MATT

I don't know. I think what that "who would you want to have a beer with" question is really saying is -who seems genuine? This is the kind of thing that can't be faked.

SENATOR LOWELL

I think you're right. (TO MAGGIE) *
Good instincts, Miss... *

MAGGIE

Maggie Rogers, Senator. (THEY SHAKE)

I'm sorry, I know I was out of line --

SENATOR LOWELL

Not at all. I think you felt comfortable because you know I'm just an everyday human like yourself. In fact, I bet you'd like to have a beer with me.

MAGGIE

I'd love to but I'm underage.

MATT

(SOTTO) Sure, you tell her. (TO MAGGIE) Can I see you outside?

THEY EXIT THE SENATOR'S OFFICE AND GO TO MATT'S CUBICLE.

MATT (cont'd)

What are you doing? You just gotta stay under the radar until we can get you out of here.

MAGGIE

(DEEP BREATH) I think I want to stay.

MATT

What?! No. This is a bad idea. *
Why would you even want to work *
here?

MAGGIE

I feel like I could participate. People on my side just think of me as Trent's daughter. They don't listen to me.

MATT

(TENDER) That's not because you're his daughter. That's because they're all Nascar-loving idiots.

MAGGIE

It was just so cool. Having her agree with what I said.

MATT

It took me two years to experience it and you about five minutes but I know what you mean. It's a rush.

(MORE)

MATT (cont'd)

(THEN) Well, I guess I can't stop	*
you. But if you're going to be	*
working here we should establish	*
some rules. I am <u>Mr</u> . O'Brien, you're	*
<u>Ms</u> . Rogers. When you bring me my	*
coffee, do it carefully no grazing	*
of the arm as you pass by	

MAGGIE

```
You mean like this? *
```

SHE TOUCHES HIS ARM.

MATT

(BIG GULP)	Yes, that is exactly	*
what we are	trying to avoid.	*

MAGGIE

(MOVES IN CLOSER) And I	probably	*
shouldn't lean in to say	good morning	*
like this		*

SHE LEANS IN. THEY ARE ALMOST KISSING. JASON ENTERS AND THEY JUMP APART.

JASON

Matt, the Senator asked for you.

MATT

Excuse me. (TO JASON, SOTTO) Don't

ever leave me alone with her.

MATT EXITS AND HEADS FOR THE SENATOR'S OFFICE.

Matt, I just figured it out -- Maggie Rogers -- she's Trent's daughter.

Don't ever leave her alone.

MATT

What?

SENATOR LOWELL

I do not trust that man. He's not

right -- something happened to him

in space. So don't let her out of

your sight.

MATT

("PERFECT") Of course not.

 $\underline{\rm MATT}\ \underline{\rm EXITS}$ THE SENATOR'S OFFICE. A $\underline{\rm GUY}\ \underline{\rm APPROACHES}$ AND GETS VERY CLOSE TO MATT'S FACE.

GUY

(BEGRUDGINGLY) That's some nice

skin.

AND WE...

CUT TO:

*

*

TAG

<u>INT. SENATOR LOWELL'S OFFICE - NEXT DAY</u> (JASON, MATT, MAGGIE)

<u>JASON ENTERS</u>, TRIUMPHANTLY HOLDING UP "CAPITOL BEAT" MAGAZINE.

JASON

Ladies and Gentlemen, I have in my hands, the "Fifty Hottest on the Hill" which features our very own Matt O'Brien.

THERE ARE WOLF WHISTLES FROM THE OFFICE STAFF.

MATT

(TO JASON) I told you I didn't
want to do this. It makes me look
vain and -- (NOTICING, NOT HAPPY)
I'm number thirty-eight? What,
does Brad Pitt work here without my
knowing?

JASON

I'm telling you, this is gonna be good for you. A little exposure and it's a great way to meet girls, get your mind off of...

MAGGIE APPROACHES HOLDING ANOTHER COPY OF "CAPITOL BEAT" MAGAZINE.

MATT
